Serving on the American Beach Water & Sewer District Advisory Board would be a unique experience. My primary professional interest in the future of American Beach rest on the assumption that thoughtful, culturally sensitive development is consistent with the desires of all who care about this community. I have studied the pros and cons of public and private water systems, and have used both successfully. In the case of American Beach, I suspect the conversation draws to an end when everyone can turn on their faucet, flush their toilet and ride the waves of economic growth. Why do people come to American Beach despite the fact there is virtually no economic growth? Why are people willing to build multi-million dollar homes with wells and septic tanks? If one considers these questions carefully, it will guide deliberations of the Advisory Board towards recommendations with long-lasting beneficial results for American Beach and those who cherish its ambiance.

For me, the framework guiding development of a Water & Sewer District for American Beach should include a careful consideration of what the eventual outcome will be. In my opinion a fundamental question is, "How can American Beach develop infrastructure that honors its past and embraces a future that, upon reflection, makes us all proud?" Can we preserve and honor those physical and cultural monuments to help transcend fear and apprehension that a familiar way of life is slipping away? Can we embrace a future that honors the individual as an active participant in public safety decisions? I want American Beach to become the gold standard for how culturally sensitive and indigenous communities evolve in ways that augment economic growth, respect the need for public safety and insure that all citizens can become self-actualized.

Contrary as it might seem, I am not the voice of dissent. I have served successfully on boards of directors or trustees for social service agencies, property owners associations, federal scientific review boards, federal heritage commissions and university presidential task forces. I am the founder of the Franklin Town Historical Association. I plan to make it the poster child for Untold Stories of Enslaved Persons and Indigenous People. There is no place in this country where such a story could be better told. My talks to the National Park Service Science and History Symposia have been well received, partly because it is an untold story, but more importantly these talks help to contextualize American Beach in ways previously ignored.

The American Beach Water & Sewer District will hopefully become part of the natural evolution of "place", not an appendage with no contextual meaning. That is the perspective I hope to bring to the Advisory Board if selected. I am currently a commissioner of the Gullah-Geechee Cultural Heritage Corridor, of which American Beach is a part. Our charge is to help preserve cultural monuments to the culture of this area, with the goal of forming a more perfect union. I will close with one of my most cherished accomplishments. Over 20 years ago, as the keynote speaker for the institution's 150th anniversary I made a formal recommendation to the Emory University Board of Trustees and the broader community of students and scholars. Twenty years later in 2020, the new university president has made that recommendation a guiding priority for the schools efforts towards reconciliation and highlighting the

I am proud to support Edward Waters College (EWC) and Emory University in their grant submission for the National Science Foundation (NSF) Build and Broaden 2.0: Capacity at Minority Serving Institution (MSI)'s program.

The Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) career field is rapidly expanding, and new talent is desperately needed to meet the demands. Emory University is a high-ranking, research university and a Predominately White Institution (PWI) that would provide advanced technology and innovative perspectives to EWC students in STEM fields. Additionally, the educational partnership of a Methodist-based MSI and PWI would shape a unique vantage point for students and faculty of both institutions.
